Brock Is a Happy Dog

Brock, an energetic seven-year-old Shepherd mix, arrived at the MD SPCA in early February of this year. He qualified for our Lucky 7 program; through a special grant we are able to waive the adoption fee on cats and dogs who are seven years of age or older. Despite the waiver, he was not quickly adopted. We adopt out most of our adult dogs in a week or less.

To promote his adoption, we began featuring him on Facebook, selected him as our March Pet of the Month and included him in our March E-News Update. His energy and love for other dogs made him a staff favorite, but we knew he was not the right dog for everyone and stipulated that he shouldn't be adopted by a family with young children.

On March 27, Dale Littlejohn took Brock home. There was a rough period of adjustment. Dale states, "To be honest, his behavior was quite a challenge the first couple of months. But after reading a few books and working with him, he has gotten better." Brock eventually proved to be a happy, very loving and loyal dog, and he now will tolerate cats in the same room as he is.



Brock also revealed his skills as a tracker. On one of his regular long walks on the trails near

their house, Dale's wife fell behind and went down the wrong path. Dale explains, "We turned around to go look for her. As we approached the area where the trail splits, I noticed Brock had his nose to the ground and was beginning to pick up the pace and pull me along. After a while, we were in a jog and then an all out run. Around the next turn, my wife was standing waiting. That's when it dawned on me that he had tracked her down. We have since turned this into a game called "Find Mama," where my wife will intentionally take the wrong trail and he will find her." 🐾

Adoption: Looking to adopt a great dog or cat companion? Our adoption center has wonderful pets available for adoption. All pets have been spayed or neutered, vaccinated and have received flea and other parasite treatments. **Adoption Fees:** Puppy or Small Dog \$150, Dog \$125, Kitten \$100, Cat \$80.

Behavior Training: *Positive Pooch* is a one-session class that covers the fundamentals of good dog training. It is held on Saturdays and available to MD SPCA dog and puppy adopters free of charge and to other pet owners for a small fee. *All-Star Canine* is a six-week course designed to make life with your dog easier. We are located at 3300 Falls Road, Baltimore, MD 21211, in the Hampden neighborhood in Baltimore City.

From North of Baltimore: Take the Beltway (I-695) to the Jones Falls Expressway (I-83) South. Take the Cold Spring Lane Exit East. Turn right at the second traffic light onto Falls Road. The Maryland SPCA is the first driveway on the right after you pass 36th Street.

From the South: Take the Jones Falls Expressway (I-83) North. Take the Falls Road Exit; this will put you north-bound on Falls Road. Find a convenient spot to turn around, and head south on Falls Road. We are the first driveway on the right after you pass 36th Street.

Letter from the Director

DEAR FRIENDS,

Every animal has a story. Sometimes, her eyes tell us everything. It would be wonderful if the dogs and cats who come to us in need could tell us what has happened to them. When *Lola* came to us, she had been found wandering the streets. She was frightened and woefully thin. She had obviously had a litter of puppies at some point. We may never know what happened to her. But, we knew that she was now safe.

We've all seen the terrible stories on the news about the bad things that can happen to helpless animals. Seeing a dog like Lola reminded us how vulnerable pets on the street can be. As a response to the cases of abuse against animals in our city, the Mayor created the *Anti-Animal Abuse Task Force*. I am proud to represent the Maryland SPCA on this group, which is made up of representatives of various city agencies and community activists. In its final report (available online at www.baltimorecity.gov/OfficeoftheMayor/MayorInitiatives/AntiAnimalAbuseTaskForce.aspx), it is recommended that the Task Force remain a permanent commission.

Taking animal abuse seriously is important for the whole community. One of the Maryland SPCA's programs is providing a *safe haven for victims of domestic violence*. Often, an abused spouse will not leave her home for fear that her pets may be harmed. We provide a safe place for her pets until she gets on her feet. She is then able to leave a dangerous relationship and her pets, often members of the family, are safe, too.

The Maryland SPCA's best strategy for addressing abuse is our *high-volume spay and*

neuter clinic. As you have probably noticed, many of the victims of abuse are strays on the street with no owner to protect them. By performing

high-volume spay and neuter, fewer unwanted strays are born on the street. In particular, our Pit Fix program and Trap-Neuter-Return of feral cats are designed to protect the most vulnerable and abused animals in our community.

Our staff also visits area schools to *teach kindness to animals*. It is amazing what positive exposure to pets can do for children. It is incredibly rewarding to see children and pets interact safely and be able to talk about animals having feelings and emotions. These are powerful messages that our kids need to hear.

And, of course, we care for thousands of vulnerable animals each year, just like Lola. She can't tell us what she had been through. Obviously, she was tired and scared. As you can see in the photos here, she became much healthier and happier after she arrived in our care. She quickly became a staff favorite, and we were all so happy when she got adopted into her new home. (See letter from adopters p. 5.)

Your generosity makes it possible for us to save thousands of animals: protecting them from abusers, reducing the numbers of homeless pets born on the streets, teaching children to be kind and immediately caring for the most helpless and needy dogs and cats. *Thank you for saving them.* Sincerely,

PLACE BIDS OCTOBER 1 TO 26



A Summer of Progress at the MD SPCA



Baltimore has experienced its hottest summer on record, but that hasn't slowed the amazing progress of the expansion of the Maryland SPCA's adoption facility. On June 3, approximately 80 people gathered to witness the official groundbreaking ceremony, marking the start of the building phase of the project.

On hand for the groundbreaking was Arlene Gorn, whose generous gift in memory of her late husband Morton Gorn was the catalyst to begin the project. Also present were members of her family, including her daughter Karen Colvin, who was instrumental in working with the MD SPCA to launch the project, Karen's husband John and their son, Nick. Members of the MD SPCA's Board of Directors and Shawn Tarrant and Catherine Pugh, members of the 40th District legislative team, who were instrumental in securing state bond funding for a portion of the project, were also present.

Within days of the groundbreaking ceremony, construction began in earnest, first with the demolition of the temporary trailers that have housed the adoption and admissions areas for the last 13 years. Throughout June and July, foundations were dug and set, the floor was poured and the existing building was prepped for new siding. By late August, progress was dramatically apparent as the walls rose. For the first time, it was possible to walk through the space and envision the new facility.

Throughout these phases of the project, we remained open, operating out of temporary trailers as well as our remaining old facility.

We continued to admit and adopt out animals. Our staff and volunteers have adapted well to the challenges posed by construction, continuing to provide a high level of care to our animals. Our clients have accommodated our temporary set-up, following the long boardwalk to the back of the building to see the animals available for adoption.

The expanded building will house the Morton Gorn Center for Animal Adoption. Also included will be a new animal admissions area, a behavior assessment space, a new exam room and a fire sprinkler system that will allow us to provide outstanding safety and care to homeless pets.

We also will have much better space to evaluate pets and counsel pet owners who need to give up pets. One of the most dramatic changes we have made at the Maryland SPCA in recent years is to help the public find alternatives to giving up their pets to a shelter. This can include helping the pet owner solve pet behavior problems, directing them to our spay/neuter resources or listing the pet on the re-homing section of our website. By keeping pets out of shelters, we save space for the pets who truly have no other place to turn.

A unique feature of the new building is a "green roof." A section of the roof will be covered with plants. This provides additional insulation for the building, reduces storm water runoff and reduces the amount of heat the roof reflects. Of course, most of the features of the building focus on making life better for the animals in our care.

Construction is slated to be completed by February of 2011. 🐾

A Lasting Legacy for the Animals

In early 2008, the Maryland SPCA received a significant bequest, totaling more than \$700,000. The donor, Vincent Valaco (pictured below), lived modestly and had a deep passion for animals. His bequest has become an important source of funding for the Maryland SPCA's work on behalf of the animals.

Without bequests both large and small, the Maryland SPCA would be severely limited in the work that it is able to do for the animals. From providing medical care to food to adoption services, the Maryland SPCA relies on private contributions to care for animals. We do not receive any operating funds from the government or from any other animal welfare organization.

Sadly, we never had the opportunity to meet Mr. Valaco. He had never made a gift to the Maryland SPCA prior to his bequest. Nevertheless, the magnitude of such a gift speaks to the compassion he had for all creatures.

In planning your estate, including a favorite charitable cause is a way to make a gift that you could otherwise never make. When factoring in retirement savings and property, many people have much larger estates than they realize. The benefits of leaving a bequest are many. Aside from not disturbing any of your funds while you are alive, you can direct the proceeds any way you like. Also, apart from drafting the will itself, leaving a bequest is a relatively inexpensive way to make a sizable contribution.

Depending upon your circumstances, you may want to leave a specified dollar amount in your will. Or, many people elect to leave a percentage of their estate to family and organizations. This is helpful, because it is often difficult to know the exact amount of your estate. Some people make bequests of specific dollar amounts and then divide any remaining funds based on a percentage.

Just as critical as deciding the amount to bequeath, it is very important to specify the correct name of the organization to which you would like to donate. We recently shared in a bequest, but one of the organizations named never existed, which complicated the distribution of the estate. Our legal name is **Maryland SPCA, Inc.**, and bequests left to us benefit animals in the Baltimore area and other parts of the state.

To recognize individuals who have included the Maryland SPCA in their estate plans, we have created Friends Forever. Anyone who has included the MD SPCA is eligible to be included. All that is required is something in writing stating that the Maryland SPCA is in your estate plans. You need

not reveal the amount if you do not want to. We wish that we could have been able to recognize Mr. Valaco's generosity by including him in this group.

Q: If my pet is injured, can I take him to Hampden Pet Health?

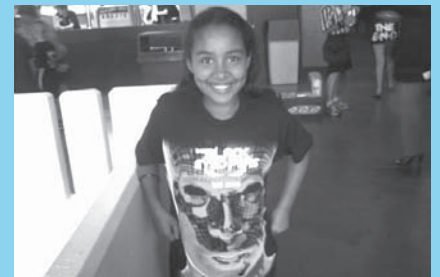
A: Hampden Pet Health does not have radiography equipment. Owners with an injured pet need to go directly to a full service clinic or an emergency hospital.
